#### i. **Effects of Video-mediated extension on stakeholders' willingness to participate in agri-business cluster in Oyo state, Nigeria**

The gap between quantity of maize being produced locally and its demand have continued to widen, due among other reasons, to competition from both industries and direct home consumption. This has particularly resulted in high price of poultry feed which uses maize as a raw material, with direct consequences manifesting in high price of poultry products and hence low protein consumption among the populace. Agri-business Cluster (ABC) as a model presents a viable option for improving local production through a win-win platform among key actors. On the other hand, video-mediated extension approach has proven to engender an informed business-related decision making among value chain actors outside of the agricultural sector. The need to ascertain how this helps to engender willingness to participate in a sustainable and profitable business relationship through the ABC model among different maize-to-poultry-feed actors informed this study. The study began in 2019 with review of relevant literature, which is now complete, after which the proposal was developed. Reconnaissance survey, validation of research instrument, data collection and analysis have been completed. Discussion of findings is ongoing.

#### ii. **Effectiveness of agri-business relations for milk production among actors in Oyo state Nigeria**

FrielandCampina WAMCO is a major milk production firm in Nigeria, and has been in an agribusiness relation with small-holder dairy farmers and other actors within the milk value chain over the past 10 years across selected states of Nigeria, including Oyo state. The relation entails cluster formation for mutual benefits among key actors within the milk value chain. Given its potential to reduce farmers-herders conflicts and in building a profitable and sustainable agribusiness relations among actors, lack of information on effectiveness of this model, tagged Dairy Development Programme (DDP), informs this study. The study therefore assesses the effectiveness of the agribusiness relations as perceived by milk actors and as revealed in associated data. The study began with review of relevant literature in 2019, after which the proposal was

developed. Afterwards, reconnaissance survey was carried out while instruments for data collection were developed and validated. Data collection activities and analysis of data have also been carried out, and presently, the study is at discussion of findings phase.
